The County of San Diego Southeastern Live Well Center

The County of San Diego Board of Supervisors supports a region that is building better health, living safely and thriving. Established in 2010, *Live Well San Diego* is the vision that aligns the efforts of over 550 partners, including individuals, organizations, and governments such as the County of San Diego, to help all 3.3 million San Diego County residents live well.

The Southeastern *Live Well* Center (SELWC) provides health and social services for people living in the community, all in one central location. Its mission is to create the opportunity for residents of all ages, gender identities, races/ethnicities, and socio-economic levels, to achieve the *Live Well San Diego* vision.

The SELWC at the southeastern corner of Market Street and Euclid Avenue provides a single stop for residents to receive a variety of services in a convenient and modern location. It serves as a hub for community meetings, educational opportunities, workspace, and workforce training. The Southeastern Live Well Center Public Art Program

Art Statement: Art at the Southeastern Live Well Center (SELWC) represents and celebrates the history, diversity and cross-cultural experiences of the community while educating, creating beauty, inspiration, and healing.

A group of local community members, the SELWC Public Art Advisory Committee, convened to facilitate the project, create the art statement, and then review, score, and vote on the artwork. The Art Consultant released a Call for Art request to the local arts community asking artists to submit proposals for artwork in a wide variety of media including sculpture, two-dimensional and threedimensional artwork, original art, oil, watercolor and acrylic paintings, limited edition prints, giclee prints, mixed media art, glass, mosaics, wall sculpture, fabric art, collages, and photography. Artist selection criteria included:

Quality and Creativity. Does the artist show proof of creating unique and inspiring work? Does the work tell a story or provide inspiration and beauty? Will the artist's style and media work well within the building spaces?


Celebrates History, Diversity and Has Roots in the Community. Does the artist come from a cultural background that is represented in the community? Has the artist worked in or lived in or near the community? Does the artist show a cultural sensitivity in the artwork?

The result is the first Public Art Collection in the County of San Diego comprised of predominately artists of color. Over 100 artists submitted concepts for consideration. Of those, 33 artists have work represented at SELWC, 14 of which are original, commissioned, custom works, while 20 additional artists provided 36 pieces of art such as: original paintings, photography, mixed media, giclee prints, one quilt, and one basket. There are a total of 50 pieces of art onsite. One hundred percent of these artists fit the art criteria of having roots in the community.

This sculpture signifies a human being pressing beyond current circumstances, leaving one space toward another while moving an obstacle out of the way. The journey requires struggle, internal and external, to go beyond the present for a better life and is a part of our shared and universal experience. The Southeastern community of San Diego is inhabited by individuals of many ancestral origins. Eight medallions representing the flora of cultural identities in the community adorn the banner to represent our diversity and commonality: American rose; Kumeyaay live oak tree and ewaa; Lao plumeria, Mexican dahlia, Philippine Sampaguita or jasmine sambac, Samoan ginger, Somalian protea and Vietnamese lotus.

Manuelita Brown creates artwork that has been described as authentic and personal. It also may incorporate subtle ideas in expressive, graceful, elegant forms. It is important to her that each sculpture elicits a connection with viewers at both emotional and cognitive levels. If the viewer remarks, "that's me—I feel just like that" or "I remember that—I've been there" or "I know him or her" then Brown has achieved a major goal. Through portrait sculptures, she hopes to represent the wonder, the promise, the mystery and majesty of creation that she sees in all.

Spirit of the Community featuring Bird Song, 2023 Seven painted and mosaic embellished totems; concrete, poured resin, lime stones (Meditation Garden)

These seven totems represent the community cultures of African American, Mexican/Chicano, Latin American, Filipino, Polynesian and Asian. The final meditation totem is the artist's personal statement of peace, love, and unity. The centerpiece, **Bird Song**, represents the Kumeyaay Nation's symbol of the oak tree. Images on the four sides symbolize earth, air, fire and water.

Jean Cornwell Wheat attended, and later had the privilege of becoming an instructor of African American art, at San Diego City College. She is one of the most important artists in our region, and her body of work and continued contributions are of vital significance to San Diego's arts and culture ecosystem as a whole.



Throughout history, people have struggled together to contest colonial fictions which seek to divide and pit us against one another. This piece reminds us there is strength in solidarity and highlights how these movements reflect diversity and interconnectedness of those seeking justice, liberation, recognition, or representation. Included are prominent civil rights era activists: bell hooks, Martin Luther King Jr., and Yuri Kochiyama; along with migrant workers' advocates: Cesar Chavez, Dolores Huerta, and Larry Itliong. Even in highly charged moments an inherent optimism is shared by those who seek positive social change and believe in a brighter future worth working toward.

Jhelen Marie Ruanto Ramirez has been deeply inspired to create art that reflects who she is and who she thinks she is with hopes that others can connect with what she is trying to express. Rather than just focusing on the finished product, Ramirez wants her pieces to be a body of work that moves and tells a story. This led her to pursue art on a scale that she could never imagine – creating murals that demonstrate a personal story deeply entwined with a forgotten history.

His vision is to design works of art that incite a visual, harmonic resonance upon the observer. 

Embedded textiles collected from different cultures; embedded ceramics utilize raw earth materials such as wild clay, stones, and sediment sourced from various parts of San Diego County (Main Lobby Stairwell)

The installation aims to honor the cosmogony of diverse cultures of the world, represented in their textiles. It also brings attention to the beauty and importance of local minerals, fauna, and flora. These juxtapositions propose a balance between people and ecosystems, traditional knowledge, and modernity.

Francisco Eme is a resident of Paradise Hills, San Diego (just a few minutes from the Southeastern *Live Well* Center). Eme has been very interested in working with the community to bring awareness about the native wildlife that still live in the neighborhood. He wants to protect and support the environment that is their home, which in return will provide balance to our ecosystems, leading to a better climate, water, and ecology. As an artist, he strives to use his art to bring awareness, hope, and love.

Aurelia Ojeda Melendrez is a famous basket weaver from San Jose De La Zorra, Baja California Mexico. She weaves coiled juncus baskets and willow acorn storage baskets. Melendrez is famous for her stunning coiled rattlesnake basket patterns and Kumeyaay basket hats. She is the daughter of the basketmaker, Virginia Melendrez and she learned to weave Indian baskets at a young age with her grandmother, Celia Silva.

The baskets were graciously gifted by the Manzanita Band of the Kumeyaay Nation for use in this public art program.



REFLECTIONS & CONNECTIONS

JOSE "BEAN" VENEGAS Reflections & Connections, 2023 5'H x 6'W Mixed media on mirror, spray paint, paint markers, and permanent markers (Main Corridor)

Using many different languages and symbols to reflect an act of kindness or human affection, this art piece is created on a mirrored surface. People can enjoy and connect while they become part of the art as they see themselves in the reflection. With different people reflected and connected the art piece is never the same and always changing.

Jose "Bean" Venegas says that living in Southeast San Diego in the 90s wasn't always a walk in the park. Surrounded by gangs, drugs, and violence, he chose to pick up a spray can instead of a gun. He was fascinated by the vandalism aspect of graffiti art. While riding the trolley to work one day, Venegas noticed a group of youth spray-painting large wooden walls with graffiti art. He witnessed more people attending the next day. Curious to learn more he skipped work one day, and never went back. Venegas was once part of the problem; now he is part of the solution.







Full of color and light, it symbolizes a new beginning and a celebration of individuality, cultural diversity, biodiversity, and community wellness.

Kaori Fukuyama is fascinated by how light affects the way we see, feel, and perceive our surroundings. The complex relationship among color, light, and shadow is the focus of her artwork, which combines sensibility to natural light, clean aesthetics, attention to craftsmanship, and evokes memories or experiences that remind the viewers of the beauty and magic of the light we encounter in our everyday life.


